How to find us

The Seed Box is situated behind the site of the old Flitwick Leisure Centre on Steppingley Road, MK45 1TH.

For security reasons there's currently a temporary fence around the old leisure centre in Flitwick. The entrance gate has been fitted with a padlock that works with an allotment key. Please be sure to close and lock the gate behind you every time you use it.

When The Seed Box is open for trading a committee member will remove the padlock and then secure the site on leaving. We ask everyone to be vigilant to ensure no unauthorised persons enter the site.

The fence is a temporary measure until Central Bedfordshire Council decide on a more permanent means of fully securing the site until it is sold.

In the meantime we will endeavour to keep you updated on the situation as soon as we hear of any proposals.

Dougie Rees - FGA Life Member

Douglas Richard Rees, otherwise known affectionately within the FGA as Dougie, was born to an ordinary working class family in Mid Wales in June 1926 and died in Hitchin on 30th April this year, aged 91. His father worked with horses on the land, and after leaving school Doug followed in his footsteps. Soon after, he joined a police force in Wales, but eventually transferred to Bedfordshire because he said he needed to be busier. He rose through the ranks in his new force, becoming affectionately known as 'Rees the Police' and served across the County and between uniform branch and CID. This all culminated in his promotion to Detective Chief Superintendent and Head of force CID. He remained in this position until his retirement from the police. During his service he was part of or led a number of high profile investigations and was involved in many more. Of note he was the first officer to interview the female victim of James Hanratty, the man who was convicted of the A6 murder at Clophill, and Doug was part of the Bedfordshire team investigating the Great Train Robbery. After leaving the police service he became Head of Security at Jaegar for several years.

From an FGA perspective Dougie was always a willing helper where he joined the Monday Mob, who ensure there's enough stock for sale of own pack goods at the Seed Box. When he decided to make an entry or two into the Summer Show I helped him to choose the exhibits and he enjoyed some success straight away. Over the course of years that friendship blossomed. Over that period he won The Banksian Medal and the National Vegetable Societies Silver medal.

The past couple of years he suffered from ill health and moved from his home in Flitwick to Hitchin to be closer to family. He leaves behind his wife Beryl, two sons, a daughter and a host of grandchildren.

Amongst other things Dougie Rees will be remembered for was his love of family, gardening, singing in the police choir, ready willingness to help others cheerfully and his wonderful Welsh smile.

Syd's Snippets

As you are aware the FGA is a member's society, run by members for its members. The Officers - Chairman, Treasurer, Secretary and Trading Officer along with the Executive Committee are elected each year at the AGM to run the Association on your behalf. Every year due notice is given, but very few attend the most important meeting of the year and this year was no different with just 8% of the membership attending and most of those were the current officers and committee members.

We can only therefore assume that we are doing what you require but despite many calls for volunteers to come forward we have not had much response. Some have come forward to volunteer for till duties and to assist in the running of sections of the trading areas and this is much appreciated. However we have had no response in recruiting key holders and at present are down to just 6 and this is to cover every Friday evening and Saturday afternoon from the start of February until the end of November. With this reduced number we are often struggling to find anyone who is available to open the building and guide the till helpers through the session and on occasions we have not able to open at all.

So unless we can quickly resolve this matter, do not be surprised that when you arrive the Seedbox will not be open. This is not our fault it is yours; for we are doing what we can. It would only take 3 - 4 volunteers for either a Friday or Saturday once every 5 – 6 weeks to resolve this situation. If we know in advance that one of the six of us cannot be there we will post a note on the gate, but often due to various reasons that occur at the last minute, we will not be able to do so.

Therefore if you arrive and we are not open it's your fault for not putting yourself forward. Please do not abuse those on duty as they are doing their bit.

In summarising, instead of complaining think, put your name forward, come and have a trial period for an hour or so alongside someone experienced and you may, as many in the past have found, it can also be an enjoyable experience.

In the meantime enjoy your gardening.

We had a total of 18 members, out of a membership of 301, attend the AGM at the Rufus Centre and all were welcomed by the Chairman. The reports for Trading, Membership and the Show Committee were in the Spring magazine and taken as read. The treasurer was unable to present the unaudited accounts for 2016 due to problems making them balance. He did however present some high level financial information to the meeting and said that both the accounts and his report would be available for the next magazine.

In his report the chairman thanked all those that helped with the running of the association and its shows, including the till helpers and the Monday mob. He especially thanked Jim and Dave for all their hard work over the year.

We now have a few people coming forward to look after 'trading areas' within the Seed box - taking some of the pressure off Jim.

A discussion took place on the fact that we're still short of people to take on a 'key holder' role during the Seed box trading times. This means that there may be times when we will not be able to open or support events that we have done in previous years, such as Open weekend / Plant sales and the Flitwick Carnival. Carolyn and Alan Kirkdale were welcomed to the Executive Committee as new Magazine editors and the rest of the Executive and Show Committees were elected unopposed. It was stated that the association needs people to take on a more active role in the Association otherwise we may not be able to continue - so please think about how you could help and talk to someone on the committee about it.

The issue of my resignation as Treasurer is still ongoing, so I am reluctantly continuing in the role until a replacement or assistant can be found.



Calling all gardeners – we request your help!

MYHarvest (Measure Your Harvest) is a new project in which gardeners can be involved, to help estimate the contribution of home-grown fruit and vegetables to UK national food production. Finding out how much food is grown at home is key to providing evidence to support the use of land for growing in urban areas, and promoting benefits to food security, healthy diets and wellbeing. Jill Edmonson and Roscoe Blevins (from Houghton Conquest), researchers at the University of Sheffield, are working with the RHS and the National Allotment Society to ask gardeners and allotment holders to provide information on the space given to edibles, and their yields. This will help them understand how much allotment and garden space is needed to ensure access to suitable land and food growing for UK cities and towns' increasing populations.

This includes a list of vegetables and fruit being surveyed, an explanation of the simple measurements to be taken and tally sheets.
